

REIMAGINING WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

High Rocks Camp provides young people with valuable tools and skills to succeed in school, in the workplace, and in their lives. The first paid student leadership positions at High Rocks were Junior Counselors and Interns - motivated young leaders who wanted to help run camp, but told us they could only afford to take part in that kind of personal development if they could still earn money to help support themselves and their families. From that point on, whether it be through AmeriCorps service, First2 student leadership, or internships and apprenticeships in our social enterprises, we've been making pathways for young people to build financial resources while they learn. High Rocks approaches workforce development the same way we've been developing leaders for nearly thirty years - using our four pillars of learning, leadership, health and wellness, and community engagement to build a strong foundation for success.

> WORKFORCE RESULTS **C** For the 2024-2025 program year, 189 participants are projected to earn \$1,660,893.



We are growing the world we want to live in by creating new pathways into the workforce, retaining those already in the workforce (including part-time and full-time interns and trainees), and directly funding job seekers. During the 2023-2024 program year High Rocks social enterprises generated \$92,000 in earned income.

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




- Partnered with New River Community and Technical College to form a Learn and Earn internship program

Our program allows participants to learn sustainable farming from seed to market, developing skills in everything from planting, harvesting, packaging, and pricing to selling locally grown and value-added foods.

OUR PURPOSE:

Founded in 2021, the West Virginia Jobs Network is an active learning lab that hosts training opportunities, promotes best practices, and encourages collaborative development and dissemination of tools, projects, and programs that shape workforce-related policies and goals.

>>> POWER SKILLS

Each partner in the WV Jobs Network brings their own set of skills, talent, knowledge, and expertise. A High Rocks contribution to the network is the development and implementation of the Power Skills Certification. FIRST2 NETWORK COMMUNICATING OUR VALUE PROPOSITION

>>> RETENTION IS GOOD BUSINESS

First2 Network is working in true partnership with student leaders to double the graduation rate of rural, first-generation, low-income and other underrepresented STEM students in West Virginia and beyond. We are starting to see the true impact of our change work on these student populations, and how increases in STEM student retention benefit both students and colleges.

of WVU STEM students persisted through graduation in 2019

First-generation STEM undergraduate students at WVU have fall-to-fall persistence rates between 49% and 64% (2005-2018). The STEM persistence rate among all First2 Network first-time freshmen is 71%, and among First2 Network sophomores and higher, 72%. Based on the 2023-2034 tuition rates, in-state residential students pay \$22,668 a year for tuition, fees, and housing at WVU.

If 100 WVU STEM students participate in First2, 72 students persisting (72%) vs. 49 students persisting (49%) at WVU could equal

<u>\$521,364</u>

in income per year for retaining an additional 23 students.

THE CRAIG SAN PIETRO STEM CENTER AND CAMPGROUND KITCHEN

FROM CONCEPT TO REALITY

>>> TRANSFORMING THE HEART OF OUR CAMPGROUND

The High Rocks community has been excitedly watching as our long-dreamed of plan for a commercial kitchen, technology center, camp office, and picnic pavilion have transformed from sketches to models to concrete and wood in only a matter of months. This new space will allow us to provide food, fun and fellowship to High Rocks Academy campers and participants across all of our major programs for years to come.



THIS PROJECT MARKS THE LARGEST CONSTRUCTION ENDEAVOR AT HIGH ROCKS SINCE OUR LODGE WAS BUILT. Ground was broken this past spring and our local contractors have been working tirelessly to get the main facility under roof before the snow flies. The first floor of the building will house a commercial kitchen and camp office while the second floor will house a technology center complete with smartboards, laptops, media equipment, and 3D printers to enhance and augment STEM learning at camp and beyond. Wood from the trees that were cleared from the campground building site will be used to fashion all of the exterior beams and posts. The structure will also include a covered pavilion to provide additional seating space (with 6 new picnic tables built by our construction class participants at Camp Steele!).
